





KATE MCCGWIRE: QUIVER A major solo exhibition at Nottingham's Lakeside Arts

Lakeside Arts is proud to present *Quiver*, a major solo exhibition by internationally renowned British artist Kate MccGwire, showing at the venue's Djanogly Gallery this autumn. Known for her extraordinary sculptural works crafted from ethically sourced birds' feathers, MccGwire's unique practice explores powerful themes of duality, beauty, and the natural world.

The exhibition offers an ambitious survey of MccGwire's work over the last 20 years, from gigantic installations to exquisitely detailed pieces. Visitors will experience the full scope of her sculptural mastery, including vast serpentine forms clad in crow feathers, pigeon feathers cascading from gallery walls, and precious works housed beneath antique glass domes. The latter being a nod to the mania for taxidermized animals in nineteenth-century museums and homes. A highlight of the show is *Cavort (West)*, a striking mosaic of pheasant feathers created for the eighteenth-century interiors of Harewood House, Yorkshire, during the Covid-19 pandemic - seen at Lakeside Arts for the first time since its original installation.

MccGwire's art challenges perceptions by elevating materials often deemed as insignificant or undesirable. She transforms pigeon feathers, considered by some to be disgusting, into intricate sculptures that invite viewers to reconsider notions of beauty and value. Her works, such as SLUICE (2009) and QUIVER V (2012) celebrate these overlooked materials, encouraging a deeper and rethought appreciation for the natural world. Each feather is ethically collected, meticulously cleaned, and selected for its form and texture, creating intricate patterns that shimmer with light and emotional resonance. Ravishingly seductive her works play with notions of disgust, joy, pain and pleasure as they simultaneously explore the dark underbelly of beauty.

MccGwire's studio is as unique as her materials. For more than a decade, MccGwire has worked aboard a converted 100-year-old Dutch barge moored on the River Wey in West London, a tranquil space that mirrors her deep connection to water and nature. This connection dates back to her upbringing in the wild landscapes of the Norfolk Broads, where natural beauty and wild waterways laid the foundation for an art form that breathes alternative life into natural materials.

As Neil Walker, Head of Visual Arts Programming at Lakeside Arts, comments:

"To be able to show Kate's work is a great coup for Lakeside. She transforms discarded materials into something deeply moving and extraordinarily beautiful. It's an astonishing achievement. I think our visitors will want to return time and again to fully appreciate her artistry."

Quiver marks MccGwire's most extensive UK solo exhibition in recent years. While she has exhibited widely, including at the Saatchi Gallery (London), the Museum of Arts and Design (New York), and the Venice Biennale, this show offers a rare opportunity to see the full breadth of her practice on home soil.
